Our amazing team helped GREYlong have a record year in 2014. GREYlong distributed over \$20,000, representing an increase of \$5,000 from 2013, to the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Minnesota Veterinary schools to support two studies on osteosarcoma and to continue funding a study on hemangiosarcoma. This can only happen when like-minded people join together to make a difference. Simply amazing!



Tracking the Treasurer in 2014

GREYlong's 2015 Study: Niche Conditioning for Metastasis in Canine Osteosarcoma

When GREYlong was formed in 2006, there were very few studies focused on canine cancer. Nine years later, there are more universities and institutes working to help our dogs. We give thoughtful consideration to where funds are invested and will continue to support the University of Minnesota Animal Cancer Care and Research (ACCR). The ACCR is a joint program of the College of Veterinary Medicine and the Masonic Cancer Center. ACCR's mission is to advance knowledge and to translate it into delivery of care, to reduce the incidence of cancer and its impact in human and animal patients.

We asked Dr. Modiano, Director of ACCR, to identify a project in need of support. GREYlong made a commitment to support the following study in the amount of \$25,000. Here are the details.

Project Title: Niche Conditioning for Metastasis in Canine Osteosarcoma

Osteosarcoma (bone cancer) is an incurable cancer. Local control of bone cancer is feasible with

Why study osteosarcoma?

amputation or limb sparing surgery, but distant spread (metastasis) is almost inevitable and is the cause of death for almost every dog with this disease. Due to common genetics, dogs with OS provide an important model for the same disease in humans.

What accounts for metastasis? We do not understand the mechanisms that allow osteosarcoma cells to spread from bone to lungs (or elsewhere), but recent work suggests that the tumors send out "scout parties" in the form of small cell fragments called exosomes. These exosomes deliver biologically active materials

that make distant sites welcoming for wayward tumor cells. This project is designed to find markers in the exosomes that will allow us to predict where and when the disease will spread, as well as to identify targets we can use to delay or prevent this spread.

How is this different form other ongoing work in the field of osteosarcoma? The project is exceptionally innovative, applying highly sophisticated strategies that will allow us to understand how the tumor affects the distant environment, and vice versa. To our knowledge, this specific approach has not previously been applied to any cancer of dogs, or even humans.

How does this benefit our dogs? The project is designed to enhance our understanding of metastasis in osteosarcoma so we can predict which dogs are at the highest risk for life-threatening disease progression and so we can find treatments to effectively prevent this. The results from this project will bring us closer to our long-term goals to reduce morbidity and mortality of large and giant dogs that are commonly affected with this disease. This would include Akitas, Dobermans, Golden Retrievers, Great Danes, Greyhounds, Irish Setters and Wolf Hounds, Leonbergers, Rottweilers, and Samoyeds.

The Third Oktoberfest On-Line auction was larger than last year and was shared with many folks through social media. What can we say? Each year we receive more incredible items and some are just beyond description.


